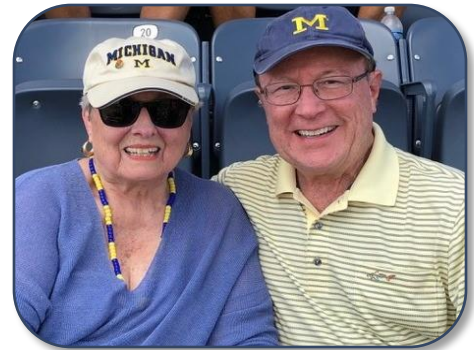

Q: What is your current position and company?
