Q: What is your current position and company?

A: Commissioner of the Florida Public Service Commission (and Chairman of Gas Technology Institute's Public Advisory Committee, Board of Directors of the National Association of Regulatory Commissioners, Presidential Task Force Member on Emergency Preparedness, Recovery and Resiliency, Southern States Energy Board's Blue Ribbon Task Force - a partnership with the U.S. DOE to provide guidance to Puerto Rico, Executive Committee Member of the Nuclear Waste Strategy Coalition, Advisory Board Member of the Financial Research Institute, and a Commission Member of the State of Florida Women's Suffrage Centennial Commission).

Q: What was your practice area at Shumaker?

A: I started with Darrell Smith's Corporate practice group as a young M&A attorney fresh out of law school.

Q: What do you enjoy most about your career?

A: The diverse experiences in the public and private sector (law firm, in-house, and city attorney) while I tried to find my passion of the law, ultimately leading to a tremendously rewarding career in the energy and utility sector.
