*Career Law Clerk to the Honorable Frank D. Whitney, United States District Judge for the Western District of North Carolina*



**Q: What is your current position and company?**

A. I am the Career Law Clerk to the Honorable Frank D. Whitney, United States District Judge for the Western District of North Carolina. In this role, I provide researched recommendations to the judge on a variety of issues that arise in civil and criminal cases. I also manage the hiring and onboarding process for term law clerks, interns, and externs.

Their institutional knowledge is a great resource when you have questions or need assistance. Finally, know the strengths and weaknesses of your case and recognize when to concede an issue to maintain credibility with the court or jury.

A. My husband Patrick and I have two daughters – Anne Louise (12) and Spencer (10). Together, we love a bike ride at the beach, game night, or family pickle ball match.
