# Environmental Update

April 2019 (Issue 1)

NEW OHIO EPA DIRECTOR LAURIE STEVENSON: EARLY IMPRESSIONS, REMARKS AT OHIO STATE BAR ASSOCIATION 34TH ANNUAL CONFERENCE ON ENVIRONMENTAL, ENERGY AND RESOURCE LAW COMMITTEE, MARCH 29, 2019

With a new governor, Ohio now has a new Director of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency - Laurie Stevenson, who has been with the Agency for most of her career. On March 29th she spoke at the annual OSBA environmental law conference and presented her current vision and view of things. Here is Laurie's short bio, taken from the program materials:

Laurie A. Stevenson Director, Ohio Environmental Protection Agency Columbus, Ohio

In January 2019, Governor Mike DeWine appointed Ms. Stevenson as director of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency. She most recently served as Deputy Director for Business Relations where she was a primary contact for regulated entities to help coordinate permitting activities within the Agency, particularly for complex projects requiring multiple permits. Ms. Stevenson also served as chief of Ohio EPA's Division of Environmental and Financial Assistance. DEFA provides financial and technical assistance to businesses and communities to help achieve compliance with the environmental regulations. A public servant of 29 years, Ms. Stevenson previously served as the industrial liaison in the Director's Office and managed Ohio EPA's Small Business Assistance Office (SBAO). She held previous positions in Ohio EPA's Division of Hazardous Waste Management, starting in the Southeast District Office as a hazardous waste field inspector. Ms. Stevenson received her BS in Environmental Health from Bowling Green State University and her MS in Public Health from The Ohio State University.

This note summarizes some of the highlights of her presentation on the 29th.

Process Driven: The new Director is process driven. She is not a micro manager, and rather is a believer in teamwork, constant staff input, transparency, and being a sounding board for the Agency's "constituents" (i.e., regulated entities and the public). One of her first tasks was to ask her leadership team for a list of their priorities and matters of significance. She intends to ultimately assemble those goals into her own "strategic vision."

She will increase efforts on staff and inspector training. In work at the Agency, she developed an extensive, interactive training program for field inspectors. She intends to keep that going and devote more efforts to assuring that her younger staff is well trained.

Consistent with her emphasis on process, she intends to spend time adding new "metrics" to keep an accounting of how the Agency is performing. She intends to streamline the direct reporting process, develop new methods for transparency reporting, and revise benchmark reporting. She plans to share those metrics openly with the public.

Finally, she is consensus driven on issues. She has great respect for the Ohio EPA program staff, and intends to seek their open and honest advice on issues as they percolate through the Agency.

Some specific issues. Director Stevenson provided some present insights into some specific issues.

- 1. Water. In her words, "the world of water is big." More specifically, she discussed the challenges facing water treatment and drinking water. She noted that Ohio's communities, both large and small, face soaring infrastructure costs necessary to keep our streams clean and drinking water safe. She made reference to Governor DeWine's recently announced H2O water funding initiative for Ohio, in which the governor will seek to create a \$900 million fund to assist with government infrastructure planning, Lake Erie, and failing septic systems, over the next ten
- 2. Emerging contaminates. At this time, the Agency is placing special emphasis on PFAs and the Lake Erie algae bloom problem. She mentioned that the Ohio EPA is currently dealing with a number of PFA groundwater plumes at certain military installations. While Ohio has yet to develop PFA standards for drinking water and groundwater, expect that Ohio will be following the lead of several states who have already established their own state standards.

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- 3. Region V relationship. The new Director's early relationship with the Region 5 administrator, Cathy Stepp, is positive. She has had preliminary discussions with the Regional Administrator, and feels that the future months will be cooperative and open. She expects that the Region will continue to place more responsibility on program issues on the States. The Region will continue to work on resolving certain "legacy issues" (a euphemistic term for the more disagreeable issues).
- 4. Staff stability. Ohio EPA has some exceptionally talented program people. Two of the most well-known are Bob Hodanbosi and Mike Hopkins. Both have been at the Agency since the beginning of the Ohio Air Program. They both have exceptional knowledge of the Program and how it works in practice. Both Bob and Mike are eligible for full Ohio retirement benefits, and the air-regulated community has been concerned about how the program will function when they retire. Director Stevenson disclosed to the conference attendees that both men have no current plans to leave. As to Ohio EPA staff demographics, Stevenson described the Ohio EPA staff as having a "blob of people near retirement and a blob of new people." At least 30% of the staff has less than 5 years of experience. Perhaps this is part of the reason Director Stevenson believes that training will be a priority.

Laurie Stevenson is a balanced, consensus-building Director. Expect her to be open to her staff as well as permit holders and the environmental community. Continued good relations with the Region and her program staff will be at the top of her agenda, as well as improvements in all of the Ohio EPA management systems. She has been open to meeting with industry groups or regulated industries to discuss the priorities, critical regulatory issues and Ohio permitting issues, and likely will continue to do so. Laurie seems to be a "you get what you see" type of person, and is excited about the new job.

Brine Disposal Fee Draft Rules Request For Comments: The Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Division of Oil and Gas Resources Management (DOGRM) requests comments regarding draft rules that establish requirements and procedures for annual submittal of a brine disposal fee. The draft rule amplifies Ohio Revised Code (ORC) 1509.22 (H) by providing a standard form and submittal deadline for each owner of a Class II Disposal well to submit an annual fee to the DOGRM. The draft rule requires a form prescribed by the chief and the calculated fee to be submitted to DOGRM on or before February 15th for brine disposed of during the preceding calendar year.
